Symbolism:



Photos of the person or theme being honored.



Cempasúchil (Marigolds) the scent of flowers help guide the souls to the altar.



Candles light the way for souls.



Pan de Muerto (bread) represents the dead and feeds hungry souls.



Water is for thirsty souls.



Calaveras represent the afterlife.



Alebrijes are spirit guides.
